You are in for an exciting, informative year, as you travel to ancient and modern times of many different places throughout our world. 6th grade Social Studies builds chronological and thematic understanding of ancient and modern civilizations through developing content and concepts of: World History, Geography, Economics, Political Systems, and Cultures.

How government and citizenship works in the U.S. today

How citizenship and governments began in classical Greece and Rome

Unit 3: The Impact of Economics: Change and Continuity in China

How economics affects our lives today

The impact of economics on the history of China and East Asia

Unit 4: Cultural Systems Past and Present

How people interact through their cultures today

The development of major cultures in four regions around the world

As we explore these topics, you will build your skills in: critical and creative thinking, communication, problem-solving, information literacy and research, collaboration, and independence as well as Reading, Writing, and Thinking.
