I hope that means you and your family are able to enjoy a week of good times and relaxation.

Of course, I'm going to recommend everyone read over break. The America Reads challenge is just about over. That was the program we endorsed back in February encouraging everyone to read 30 minutes a day for 30 days in March, so if your child has a calendar all filled in, please make sure it isn't forgotten when we get back to school. Have your kids bring back the completed calendars in order to enter the drawing for some pretty wonderful prizes!

Even without an incentive program, the very best way every child can keep in top form for success at school is to read every day — and it's fun! Remember the Black-eyed Susan Award competition is in season again.

This week we completed our recertification application for designation as a Maryland Green School. It was a lot of work, but it made me very proud to review the many ways in which we have emphasized learning about our environment and living responsibly.

John Poole was originally named an official Green School back in 2004. Since then we have had one successful application for recertification (2008) and this year's application marks our second renewal. When you have a long history of doing important work, it is both easier and harder to win continued recognition. It's easier because awareness is already in place and fundamental structures have been incorporated into the way we do business. It's harder because the basics have already been done, and it takes some creativity and real commitment to keep finding new means of advancing the work. For example, we replaced our lighting with long-lasting, energy efficient bulbs two years ago. That's a project we won't have to repeat until sometime after 2020! In the intervening years, we have to find new ways to improve our energy profile.

About Anxiety and Depression in Children and Teens

About one in eight children suffer from an anxiety disorder, a category that includes obsessive-compulsive disorder (OCD), panic disorder, social anxiety disorder, separation anxiety, phobias, generalized anxiety disorder, and PTSD. These disorders often occur simultaneously with ADHD, depression, bipolar disorder, eating disorders, and others.

When anxiety becomes unrelenting and persistent, it can interfere with your child's everyday activities, making it difficult to play, relax, sleep, or concentrate. Children and teens may experience stomach and headaches and other physical ailments. Anxiety in children and teens may not be obvious because it may appear to be irritability, sleep problems, or refusal to join in family or social activities. Find out how you can help your child avoid a lifetime of anxiety.

New Research

Recent scientific advances have led to effective treatments and show that early intervention is critical. Waiting for your child to mature or grow out of these behaviors may not be the right approach. 


