Dear Parents/Guardians of incoming sixth, seventh, and eighth graders,

In Montgomery County Public Schools, summer reading has been an expected practice in middle and high schools since 1998. The ability to read is crucial to an individual's success in school and on the job. Reading is a life-long skill that gives individuals the opportunity to learn about people, times, regions, and ideas that they may never actually encounter in life. Research strongly suggests that reading improves with practice and decreases when students do not read for even a short time. Therefore, consistent with our commitment to prepare all Wood students for success during school and after graduation, we in MCPS expect all students to read throughout the year.

Here at Earle B. Wood Middle School, we believe that during the summer our students need to read to develop a leisure time reading habit, reinforce reading skills, and prepare for the fall's first unit of instruction in English. To that end, all students are required to read two books this summer.

Students should read books that excite them. They may choose any books, fiction or nonfiction, as long as they have not been read previously, are on an appropriate reading level for your child, and are approved by a parent or guardian. A list of suggested authors is included in this packet of information.

SUMMER READING ASSIGNMENTS:

Students are required to respond <u>in writing</u> to the two summer reading assignments included in this letter. For both assignments, students take notes to answer several questions. These notes will prepare the students for a writing assignment during the beginning of the school year and for a short book talk they will share with their peers during Book Celebration Day on September 5, 2008.

Both book assignments are due by Friday, August 29, 2008. Each assignment will be worth ten achievement points for the first quarter English grade. Please review the two summer reading assignments with your child to ensure they have every opportunity to complete the assignment correctly.

Students who enroll after school begins will have three weeks to submit the notes.

- > Select titles that you have not read previously.


For one of the books, take notes to answer these questions:

- 6. What is the theme (idea the author wants you to remember about life) of this novel?

You will share information about your book with a small group. This book share is worth ten achievement points for the first quarter grade in
English. You must turn in these notes to your English teacher by the end of the first week of school, August 29, 2008. These notes should be brief, neat, legible, and written in ink or typed. You will use these notes to prepare a 2-3 minute book talk about your second book.

If your book is fiction:

> Make time for reading!

- 1. What is the book's title and the author's name?
- 2. What made you choose this book?
- 3. What was the most exciting part of the book? Describe and tell why.
- 4. What kind of a person is the main character? Does he/she remind you of someone you know?
- 5. What is the main conflict (problem) this character faces in the story?
- 6. What appealed to you most about this book?
- 7. Was the ending of the book what you expected? Why or why not?

OR, If your book is non-fiction:

- 2. What are the book's title and the author's name?
- 3. What made you choose this book?
- 4. What was the most exciting part of the book? Describe.
- 5. What did you learn from reading this book?
- 6. How might you use this information? Explain.
- 7. Who would benefit from reading this book?
