Kindergarten

Kindergarteners will finish up unit 3, which focuses on **stories**, and start unit 4, which focuses on **plants**. They will work on the language skills below:

- expand sentences by using prepositional phrases
- add adjectives to their speaking to give details
- distinguish between living and non-living things
- identify the connection between what living and nonliving things need to survive
- sequence and retell the life cycle of a plant

First Grade

The students in first grade are finishing up a narrative unit with the theme "different lands, similar stories", and will begin unit 4 about early world civilizations. They will:

- compare/contrast life during ancient times with life today
- identify and use past tense verbs
- identify and describe reactions to different situations
- condense several ideas into one sentence
- determine multiple meanings of words

Second Grade

Second graders will use what they learned in unit 3 about the **ancient Greek civilization** to their learning in unit 4, focusing on **Greek Myths**. They will work on the following skills:

- add descriptive details to sentences
- recount a myth by sequencing events
- use linking and temporal words and phrases to connect events
- write descriptive details using adjectives
- draft, proofread, and edit a Greek myth



Fourth graders are beginning part two of **Empires in the** Middle Ages where students examine Islamic Empires in what is now called the Middle East.

Students will work on the following language skills:

 giving and supporting opinions using modals



Third graders will wrap up unit 3 on the human body and begin unit 4, which is about the **ancient** Roman civilization. They will:

- identify key words and main ideas in texts about Roman gods and goddesses
- distinguish how synonyms produce shades of meaning and on the audience different effects



- determine the meaning of unknown words using prefixes
- distinguish between past, present and future verb tenses

Fourth Grade

- applying meaning with content specific vocabulary
- writing biographical reports



Fifth Grade

Fifth graders will begin their poetry unit in which poets included are of European, Middle Eastern, African American, Native American, and Hispanic descent.

Throughout the unit, students will read texts closely and carefully. Students will also demonstrate their understanding



of poems through written analysis and poetry writing!

Poetic language skills include:

- rhythm, rhyme, and stanzas
- figurative language
- vocabulary
