FALL - WINTER

COLLEGE PLANNING

- Visit the college/career center. Become familiar with your CCIC and how they can support you throughout your high school career.
- Identify your interests and skills to help you focus on your goals
- Take the PSAT, if available at your school.

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

- Explore and engage with extracurricular activities (e.g., clubs, sports, community service, fine and performing arts, work, and other in-or-out-of-school activities) that align with your values and strengths.
- Create an activity log to track all your extracurricular activities, summer experiences, academic honors, and other achievements.
- Volunteer for something you find important to earn SSL hours.

SPRING

ACADEMICS

- Refocus your study habits and finish the year strong.
- Keep up your grades colleges look at your grade point average (GPA).
- Set your sophomore class schedule with your counselor to include honors, Advanced Placement (AP) and International Baccalaureate (IB) classes. Remember to make this a manageable goal that is realistic.
- Create a four year academic plan with your counselor.

- Meet with your career coach to take RIASEC and help you better understand your interests, values, and skills, and how they relate to potential career paths.
