SUMMER (BEFORE SENIOR YEAR)

COLLEGE APPLICATION SEASON BEGINS.

- Set up a meeting with the college/career coordinator and school counselor to discuss your plans.
- □ Draft your application essays and/or personal statement; work with the college/ career coordinator for feedback.
- □ Prepare a resume and complete the Student questionnaire/Brag Sheet in Naviance to list all of your non-academic activities and honors.
- ☐ Communicate with college admission representatives for questions you may have.
- ☐ Begin planning visits to colleges you are interested in attending.
- Request letters of recommendations from teachers, coaches, counselors, etc.
- ☐ Create Common Application Account using your personal email address.
- Continue to research scholarships, adding requirements and deadlines to your list.
