





Scholarships: Types & Application

Athletic, Academic, State & Local, Online & Paper







Athletic scholarships (D1 and D2) eligibility requires NCAA Clearinghouse Registration. Talk to your coaches and visit eligibilitycenter.org. Registration should take place in junior year!

Application can be online or hard copy paper.

Academic scholarships can be offered by private organizations as well as colleges. Eligibility can be based on GPA and/or college test scores, leadership and/or community service.

State & Local scholarships

can be offered by your home state, senators, delegates, county and/or your high school.

Know your state legislative district by visiting **mdelect.net**

Students can also be nominated for scholarships either by self-nomination or school nomination.

Make sure your counselor gets to know you!



Search college financial aid offices...

- •Search the financial aid web pages on college websites where you plan to apply. Look for scholarships tied to your major or place of residence. Check the department page on the college website if you have a predetermined major.
- •Connect with the financial aid offices at colleges you are considering by phone and/or email.
- Always be courteous no matter what the outcome of the conversation make sure you note the name and date of each chat! Save your email communications.



•Be mindful of priority deadlines! For instance, UMD College Park accepts applications by Priority and Regular decision deadlines...


but gives "best consideration" for merit scholarships to those students applying by the Priority, November 1 deadline.



Cast a wider net...

Look at businesses and organizations where your family has a connection.

Visit the web sites of your local credit union or banking institution.



Visit the web sites of your state senators and delegates. Maryland residents may qualify for merit or career based scholarships if they plan to attend a Maryland post-secondary institution. Each senator and/or delegate may have their own application process.

Scholarship search



When searching for scholarships don't make assumptions based on the scholarship funder or organization name!

For instance, **Blacks in Government** and the **Taiwanese Community** offer scholarships to high school seniors regardless of race or ethnicity.

The **Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority** offers some of their scholarships to seniors regardless of gender!

Look at the criteria before deciding to apply!

Play the odds! They could be in your favor!


- Plan to dedicate time to your searches. Don't expect the site to do the work for you.
- Beware of scam websites. Sites should not ask for fees for searching or applying for scholarships scholarships are a free resource for your college or career school education. Do not provide your social security number when registering on a web site.

The Scholarship Essay or Personal Statement ...

Writing a Winning Scholarship Essay & the Four R's:

- Rules due date word count format residency age follow the rules!
- Research the web site and the essay topic
- wRite to grab the readers and make them want to know more!
 How do your goals and values CONNECT with the funder's goals and values?
- Review not once not twice... submit your essay to an expert!
 Use your school resources like your English teacher or tutor



Essay Tip: Keep copies (hard and electronic) of papers you have written in high school where you have received high grades.



Increase your chances....

- Disregard the dollar amount. It all adds up!
- **Get personal with your essay.** Tell your story.

"Personal stories provide unique ideas and a backdrop for scholarship committees to really get to know the applicants".

- Apply. Dollars go unclaimed because of lack of applicants.
- Keep your grades high. Be ready to advocate for yourself if your grades slip.
- **Don't give up.** You may not get every scholarship you apply for but that does not mean you won't get something for your efforts. Take charge of your education & paying for it.
- **Do Not Google scholarship applications.** There should be a website link or a link on your high school website to access the application. Using Google may not get you the right application!
- **Keep track of your applications**, including the contact information, when you applied and how you applied.
- Check email!! Most college career information centers in the high schools will regularly communicate scholarship information to you via email to your mcpsmd.net account... but when applying for scholarships use your personal email!
